successful year for our charity. We never lost sight of the welfare of the Friends we help on a daily basis. Our sponsor base increased markedly with many "big named" corporate sponsors supporting

throughout the year and in particular over the Christmas period when we need that little extra with donations, produce, meals and essential items. There is an exciting sense that the general public in Tweed have embraced us as their own with so many offers from the public by way of clothing, tinned food and finance for the homeless and marginalised. A major goal was constant lobbying for crisis accommodation and a drop-in centre for the many homeless men and women in the Tweed. Success is not possible without the wonderful support from our volunteers whose numbers totalled over 60 this year. It is so encouraging that many volunteers have come to know our Friends and the circumstances of their situation as they embrace them as personal mates and family. Our volunteers or "vollies" are from all walks of life and unselfishly give up their time to assist with serving food, packing vans, sorting and distributing clothes, supporting our many fundraising events and much more. Our local school sponsorship has increased with many schools embracing us as "their charity" donating food items and volunteering with us on the streets. No longer are we forced to use our own vehicles at the many locations or "outreaches" we support as we have now two outfitted vans with a third about to be purchased through most generous sponsors.

Outreaching is our term for "reaching out" to our friends and providing them with love, food, clothing and necessities at locations they are able to travel to and join us. This year we consolidated our meal outreaches limiting them to Coolangatta, Tweed Heads, Chinderah and Murwillumbah. However, we did begin new successful "food drop" services to four caravan parks and also a large housing commission estate. This was made possible when our charity was selected by Tweed Heads Woolworth branch to distribute their day old unsold bread and produce. The weekly Murwillumbah BBQ is also a favourite and much talked about by our Friends, This successful BBQ would not be possible were it not for our dedicated "Murwillumbah team" of helpers. The sorting and distribution of donated clothing is a mammoth task. Once again, one of our dedicated volunteers has taken on this task and is doing a wonderful job ensuring many needy people in the district get the clothes so generously donated. Our Court Support outreach in Tweed Heads court, provides much needed funding for fuel for our growing fleet of vans. It is testament to the three ladies who run that service that their "gold coin" fundraising weekly efforts at the court for delicious sandwiches, hot drinks and the sale of cold drinks, has almost doubled in 2010.

Fundraising in any non profit organisation is essential for insurance, registration, fuel, audit fees and supplies

2010 was a very happy and to name just a few. 2010 saw many major fundraising events undertaken and supported by our wonderful band of volunteers. It is a legal requirement that registered organisation's books are audited annually. Our two dedicated volunteers who tend the books throughout the year in preparation for the audit are to be highly commended for their wonderful efforts. Close scrutiny, attention and recording of finances applies to not only the weekly income and expenditure, but very importantly to the many fundraising events we undertook this year. Events such as the "Cards on the Table", our "Monster Christmas Raffle", the ongoing sale of chocolates, the distribution of collection tins in shops, are examples of successful projects run and organised by our volunteers, with a "no fuss, no accolades, just get down and do it" attitude. Not to forget the planning and organisation that went into major events such as our National Homeless Week and the Christmas period celebrations.

> National Homeless Week in August is now firmly etched into our calendar. This year saw the first of a regular "Inter Schools Surfing Competition" held between six local schools with the inaugural event won by Kingscliff-High. The successful school's pancake and breakfast BBQ was also a first during the week and a fitting lead up to our fast becoming popular "Jimbo's Sleepout". The number of sleepers on the St. Joseph's College Oval doubled this year with more families joining us to experience a night of sleeping in a cardboard box in the cold and rain with only a meagre basic evening meal and BBQ brekkie. Other events of note we celebrated were Easter, Australia Day, Mother's and Father's Day where we provided special items for our Friends at our regular Sunday Breakfast Outreaches. The Murwillumbah Banana Festival was once more a highlight with our own Kirsty Luken taking out the title of "Miss 2010 Queen" and in the process raising much needed funds for us. There were though other events during the year that were not of a fundraising nature, rather an effort to raise awareness of requirements for the homeless.

> In November we held an "All night vigil" at the Catholic Church in Tweed Heads. This involved remaining all night at the church with a number of our homeless friends who sleep on the streets. It was our effort to raise much needed awareness of lack of crisis accommodation and an effort to lobby the authorities for a "drop-in centre". Such a centre need not be expensive to maintain or outfit. Just a place our homeless can shower, wash clothes, perhaps make a cup of tea or coffee and relax for a while and a place the community services can come to them. A place seriously required considering that Tweed Heads has the highest number of homeless persons per capita in NSW - with over 120 people sleeping rough on any one night (Census 2006).

> This report would not be complete, were it not for a special THANK YOU to our wonderful volunteers or "our vollies" as I call them. Without their dedication, tirelessly giving of themselves and always ready to support the charity and what it stands for, You Have A Friend would

not be as successful as it is today. Your support at our outreaches, packing and sorting of clothes, rosters, driving vans, working at courts, accounting, food collection and most of all your love, kindness and dedication to our major cause of supporting those less fortunate than ourselves, is what makes our wonderful charity – Thank You. In addition a special thank you to our Board members who have given such wonderful support to both me and the charity this year. I sincerely look forward to working with you again this year – Thank you.

Squatters

In Southwark London Borough Council vs Williams [1971] Ch 734 (CA), the defendants were homeless families who squatted in empty houses owned by the council. The council regarded the houses not worthy of repair and unfit for human occupation. Nearly 9000 people were on the council's waiting list for housing. The council's policy was that

individuals should not get priority by squatting in empty houses. The council applied for an order for immediate possession. The Court of Appeal rejected a defence of necessity. Lord Denning MR said:

"... if homelessness were once admitted as a defence to trespass, no one's house could be safe. Necessity would open a door which no man could shut. It would not only be those in extreme need who would enter. There would be others who would imagine that they were in need, or would invent a need so as to gain entry....The plea would be an excuse for all sorts of wrongdoing. So the courts must for the sake of law and order, take a firm stand. They must refuse to admit the plea of necessity to the hungry and the homeless and trust that their distress will be relieved by the charitable and the good" (at 744)

Judging Our Homeless



Around a church in Tweed Heads are many homeless people confronting the parishioners on a daily basis. Each night they are

there. During the day a pile of possessions neatly stacked in a Woolworth's shopping trolley is all we see of these people. These people? The majority are women, all over 40 years old, sleeping in the doorways of the church at night and during the day, seven days a week, no matter the weather, forced to sit for 12 hours at bus shelters! How is it that in our beautiful Coolangatta/ Tweed Heads there are now more women sleeping on the streets or in cars, than there are men? And only two of these homeless are under 30 years old with many into their 50s and 60s.

Over the last few years I have seen a welcome change of attitude toward the homeless and marginalised by



many people, both young and old within the Tweed. A change to one of greater acceptance and understanding. There are always those who are offended by homeless women

men sleeping around the churches, sitting at bus shelters or around the BBQs meant for the "holiday makers". In the Tweed Heads district average accommodation costs more than fortnightly social benefits. Besides that there is a 16 year waiting list for housing in Tweed Heads and those suffering mental illnesses, addictions or lack of work are expected to support themselves while on prescription drugs for mental or other issues.

Contrary to what many believe, mental illness is not alreally know the circumstate ways caused by drug and alcohol misuse. Many children life and their upbringing?

are born to parents, addicted to alcohol and/or illegal and legally prescribed drugs. Do we ever consider these children are more than likely born into a life of mental issues and addictions? A life which often leads to loneliness and isolation as they struggle with imagined friends or voices that only they see and hear as they aimlessly wander the streets on their own. I have no doubt this is the case for so many of those we are so quick to label alcoholics or drug addicts we piously claim are responsible for their lives.

The legal drugs many doctors readily prescribe to people suffering all sorts of mental anguish and aches, if used for periods of time



are also addictive. In many cases, legally prescribed drugs have side effects often causing more pain and suffering to those with no homes to retreat to as they live out their complicated, painful and lonely homeless wandering lives. Sadly, addiction to legally prescribed drugs is, to a certain degree accepted by society. The institutions supporting our mentally affected people have over the last few decades been radically scaled back as more and more people are left to fend for themselves with the notion that medication will take the place of human kindness, love and support.

Every man, woman and child has a story to tell and no person's path through life is the same. For many, without support when developing as a child, social skills, education and life choices are not taught as the child develops perhaps in a dysfunctional family.

often abused and left to care for themselves as marriages break up.
Let use therefore be aware that not all homeless people are products of their own destiny. Let us see them in a new light. Very importantly are we really qualified to judge the lives of those we see sleeping around churches and park benches? Do we really know the circumstances of their life and their upbringing?

A Drop In Centre For Tweed Heads

It is hard to imagine a life with no place to call home. No place to rest, wash clothes, perhaps watch a little television, have a cup of coffee, take a shower or just sit and talk to someone who cares. And yet, to a number of homeless and marginalised people in Tweed Heads, that is all life offers them. A life of total boredom, sleeping on dangerous streets at night and the morning finds them heading for the bus shelter or park bench. It is here many will spend the entire day, per-



haps with a bottle of cheap liquor, which they hurriedly push into a grubby bag at the sign of police. Such is life for our homeless people, regardless of the weather, the season and the time of year. Today is the same as yesterday. Today will be the same as tomorrow and potentially the same for the rest of their life. Sadly, for many they see no way of ever climbing out of the hole they are in. The 2006 Census identified Tweed Heads as having the highest number of homeless people per capita in the state of NSW and no doubt the homeless numbers have since increased.

Over the last two years, we at "You Have A Friend" have endeavouring to obtain crisis accommodation or at the very least a "drop-in centre" for the many homeless and marginalised people in Tweed Heads district. If we are not in a position to provide crisis accommodation, then we should provide at least a "drop-in centre" for these people who after all are Australians, many having fought for their country in the last war or Vietnam.

"Drop-in centres" are nothing new and in fact many country towns and cities have them. If drop-in centres were of no use, there is no doubt they would already have been abandoned. They are places not to be feared, are inexpensive and very importantly, places the homeless can once more obtain some dignity and turn their lives around for the better.

In Tweed Heads, You Have A Friend is actively seeking support from all forms of government for a drop-in centre. A place the homeless can seek out and obtain vital information important for their wellbeing and a place the

many charities can provide meals from. All that is required is a building no bigger than an average house, with a toilet, shower, a washing machine, iron, microwave oven, a fridge/freezer and a place to sit and relax. It is important that the clients have access to a computer to assist in seeking work or emailing family. Very importantly, the centre needs the support services to operate from there on a weekly basis. It is important for example that Centrelink, drug and

alcohol, housing etc. regularly attend. In this way, the services are concentrated in one location. At present homeless services in Tweed Heads are spread over a 4 kilometre range and for those without transport, this is often impossible.

It has been indicated to You Have A Friend by the authorities that "drop-in centres" are not popular with council as "no one" wants such a place near their homes or offices. There is an imagined fear that it will attract drug and alcohol addicts and other undesirables. This is not the case if the centre is properly run. In Murwillumbah their drop-in centre has operated for years in regular office hours with a qualified staff, most of which are volunteers and most importantly, the clients who access the centre know the rules and are only too grateful for a central place they can obtain information, rest and shower if needs be.

You Have A Friend has been advised recently by the authorities that a Drop-in Centre for Tweed Heads presents many complications and our charity needs to source the location and present a proposal suitable for council. In the meantime, the many homeless people in Tweed Heads are left wandering aimlessly or sitting around areas the council and police would prefer that are left for "tourists". Without support and no place to shower or use toilet facilities, the council must face the fact that Tweed residents will have their gardens and properties used as public toilets. As we have always maintained, "Where do you go when there is nowhere to go"?
