From The President!

It is hard to believe on the 1st May 2010 our registered charity "You Have A Friend" will be two years old. We consider a most generous donation of funds to purchase a second van, as our birthday gift. For this wonderful donation we are most grateful to Mrs Rosalba Gustin who on behalf of the Mamma Lena & Dino Gustin Foundation donated the finance. This will now

provide us the ability to continue the support so needed by the homeless and marginalised in the Tweed district. We will be much more mobile and effective in this support of our friends at our outreaches with meals, fresh fruit, vegetables and bread to the hundreds of people in need on the Tweed.

Our outreaches serve over 300 meals a week to many living on the streets, in cars, or couch surfing. The Tweed district has the state's second highest number of homeless behind Sydney. Over the last few months I have visited Federal, State and local council politician in the Tweed Heads district regarding the lack of housing, crisis accommodation or even just a drop-in centre in the area. All to no avail and I am left once more fighting to get recognition from the authorities that there is a major homeless crisis in the district. We are now supporting women sleeping in squats in Tweed Heads, many people with mental issues, domestic violence victims and many others living in cars, behind buildings or under bridges. These people are conveniently forgotten and abandoned by the authorities.

Our Coolangatta/Tweed outreach regularly supports 30 – 40 persons each outreach. Chinderah has regular attendance of 20 – 40 persons and Murwillumbah is currently supporting 30 – 50 persons each week. Sadly, more and more children between the ages of 1 to 14 are attending our outreaches. We are in contact with approximately 20 children a week and provide food, love and care to each. Our Court outreach has progressed in leaps and bounds over the last few months and for that we thank Lorraine who has been responsible for the "new look" at the court house in Tweed Heads. Our gold coin donations have noticeable improved and in some cases more than doubled with the new displays, professionalism and a new variety of sandwiches.

In the last few months, we have successfully begun our "Food-Drop" outreach. Woolworths at Tweed Centro has authorized our charity to distribute their day old fresh fruit, vegetables and bread to the friends we support. This we gladly accepted and on four days a week we provide fresh food to two caravan parks in Chinderah as well as a housing commission estate in Tweed Heads. Our goal is a seven day fresh food "Food Drop" service to other local areas as well.

Our Murwillumbah Thursday BBQ volunteer lunch team continues to provide an amazing service. We also thank Wendy and her community centre volunteers who support us each week with the location, utensils, gas and equipment. It is at this BBQ each week that we will provide our latest venture, "bingo". The object being to alleviate some of the boredom many of the unemployed, marginalised and homeless people in the district experience. Prizes will be food hampers.

As always, this wonderful charity would not be possible were it not for the efforts of our 55 volunteers and also the wonderful support that we receive from the St. Joseph's and St. James Primary colleges of Banora Point as well as Mt. St. Patrick's College in Murwillumbah and St. Anthony's Primary in Kingscliff who provide us such wonderful support by way of students who join us on the streets and also collecting food for the many hampers we provide each week. Also not

to forgetting our many sponsors who ask for nothing except the chance to support our cause. Finally a special thanks to the Catholic Church in Tweed Heads who provide us facilities for storage of clothes, food, utensils and a kitchen to prepare meals in.

As always I reserve our greatest thanks for the caring love, respect and support our friends provide me and each and every one of our wonderful volunteers.

YHAF Court Outreach


Operating from the Tweed Heads Court Monday and Tuesday mornings.

Meet some special Voolies...

Every Sunday rain, hail or shine two of our most senior and dedicated volunteers walk hand in hand to the breakfast area to greet our friends with a warm smile. Milton and Betty met on the very same beach at Coolangatta where our breakfasts are cooked. Introduced by an Uncle some years ago, they have grown very fond of the beach. As avid swimmers you will find them every morning in Currumbin Creek at around 6.30am, a key I expect to their excellent health.

Milton worked up until the age of 84 working as a boilermaker for 24 of those years and teacher at Coolangatta State School for 26 years.



With 66 years of a wonderful marriage under their belt not a day goes by that they are not thankful for being blessed with a fabulous life they have been given. Their tips for a happy marriage they say is to keep romance alive, have a good sense of humour and have fun together. Milton jokes that if you can train your kids to always answer "Yes Dad" it can make life a little easier. With 11 children, 38 grandchildren and 40 great grandchildren they certainly have had an active lifestyle. The trick to longevity they believe is your state of mind, positive attitude and belief in God.

And so every Sunday Milton and Betty take their positions, Milton as head chef at the BBQ plate cooking sausages, despite him being vegetarian and Betty serving cereal and hot meals. Their radiant and gentle persona provide the outreach with such a warm, caring feeling all our friends delight in being in their company as much as Milton and Betty enjoy our friends.

Vollie View....

I have been helping YHAF for a few months now, serving breakfast in the Coolangatta Park, and col-



lecting items for the Christmas presents. It has brought back memories of helping with the homeless when I lived in New York City for 4 years. I lived in Mid-town Manhattan, with Grand Central Railway Station one block away one direction, and Times Square one block the other. So I was "pretty central". The church I helped out in provided cooked breakfasts, a bagged lunch and on special occasions such as July 4th or Thanksgiving and Christmas, a lovely festive dinner.

Unlike here, where we have wide-open spaces to cook and serve the meals, we had to feed everyone in the church. Some of us cooked and served, whilst others made the lunches which consisted of a sandwich, piece of fruit and perhaps a cookie.

We also had a clothing supply which we gave to people -- especially in the winter, when it would get down to well-below freezing often. The cold winds would rip right through you and I really felt for those who had to sleep on the steam vents on cardboard, just to keep warm. Of course, they had to share the space with huge cockroaches! It was a common sight to see three people all huddled over the vents.

When I compare the beautiful area we have here in Coolangatta, or Murwillumbah or Chinderah, to the hard streets of NY, where you never knew if you'd wake up in the morning or have been shot during the night, I realise that Yes, we do have challenges here, but we also are blessed to live in this lovely climate. And NY was fabulous compared to what I saw in Soweta, South Africa and the harsh streets of India. As the old saying goes, we should always count our blessings.

Vollie on a Mission...

Hi Folks.

I just want to put in a good (and grateful) word for those hotels that supported me in supplying toiletries for our Christmas baskets. Because I live on Marine Parade in Coolangatta, there are many local hotels that I could ask. I started with the high-rise I live in, and they kindly agreed to supply shampoos, conditioners and body lotions. Bolstered by this success, I ventured forth along the strip and asked every hotel in Coolangatta I



think! What was most heartening was that when I told the managers what I was collecting the toiletries for, so many of them replied "Oh yes, we've seen you down in the park cooking breakfasts and giving out food."! So we don't go unnoticed, and everyone was appreciative. Some of course had their own regulations and charities that they donated to, but most gave at least something, such as coffees, teas and sugars. I ended up with a kind of a dilemma when one hotel donated a lot of conditioners--NOW I HAD A MISSION! And that was to even up the scales by finding more shampoos!!! But it was a fruitless task it seemed. So I ventured farther afield, up Golden Four Drive, but still no shampoos were to be found. Finally, I got an inspiration to call the Royal Pines, way up in Ashmore. Why there, I have no idea--way inland, standing out by itself, but call them I did. You cannot imagine my delight when I spoke to the manager and she enthusiastically said "Oh yes, we can help you. We have 6 boxes of shampoo that we would be more than happy to donate." Off I trotted, in my little car in the middle of a wild thunderstorm, to pick up what I thought was 6 small boxes of shampoo. When the concierge said he'd help me put the



boxes in my car, I got the impression that these were slightly larger boxes than I'd anticipated. I couldn't believe my eyes when he wheeled over a luggage trolley with 6 huge boxes containing 3,000 bottles of shampoo!!! One part of me said "Oh no, now I have to go and find a lot more conditioners!" the other part said "I can rest now--my task is complete!" And as I handed out the little bags of toiletries that Dorothy and friends had made up, at our Christmas Party in Coolangatta, I was so moved by how many happy and grateful faces I saw. I look forward to doing the job again at the end of the year. Thanks again to everyone who contributed.




